P For the steadfast assurance that nothing can separate us from your love and for the courage to stand firm against the assaults of Satan and every evil, hear our prayer, O Christ.





The Prayer of the Day

P Let us pray.

Lord our strength, the battle of good and evil rages around us, and our ancient foe tempts us with his deceits and empty promises. Keep us steadfast in your Word, and when we fall, raise us up again and restore us through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.



The Word

Some time later God tested Abraham. He said to him, "Abraham!"

"Here I am," he replied.

² Then God said, "Take your son, your only son, Isaac, whom you love, and go to the region of Moriah. Sacrifice him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains I will tell you about."

³ Early the next morning Abraham got up and saddled his donkey. He took with him two of his servants and his son Isaac. When he had cut enough wood for the burnt offering, he set out for the place God had told him about. ⁴ On the third day Abraham looked up and saw the place in the distance. ⁵ He said to his servants, "Stay here with the donkey while I and the boy go over there. We will worship and then we will come back to you."

⁶ Abraham took the wood for the burnt offering and placed it on his son Isaac, and he himself carried the fire and the knife. As the two of them went on together, ⁷ Isaac spoke up and said to his father Abraham, "Father?"

"Yes, my son?" Abraham replied.

"The fire and wood are here," Isaac said, "but where is the lamb for the burnt offering?"

⁸ Abraham answered, "God himself will provide the lamb for the burnt offering, my son." And the two of them went on together.

⁹ When they reached the place God had told him about, Abraham built an altar there and arranged the wood on it. He bound his son Isaac and laid him on the altar, on top of the wood. ¹⁰ Then he reached out his hand and took the knife to slay his son. ¹¹ But the angel of the Lord called out to him from heaven, "Abraham! Abraham!"

"Here I am," he replied.

¹² "Do not lay a hand on the boy," he said. "Do not do anything to him. Now I know that you fear God, because you have not withheld from me your son, your only son."

¹³ Abraham looked up and there in a thicket he saw a ram caught by its horns. He went over and took the ram and sacrificed it as a burnt offering instead of his son. ¹⁴ So Abraham called that place The Lord Will Provide. And to this day it is said, "On the mountain of the Lord it will be provided."

¹⁵ The angel of the Lord called to Abraham from heaven a second time ¹⁶ and said, "I swear by myself, declares the Lord, that because you have done this and have not withheld your son, your only son, ¹⁷ I will surely bless you and make your descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky and as the sand on the seashore. Your descendants will take possession of the cities of their enemies, ¹⁸ and through your offspring all nations on earth will be blessed, because you have obeyed me."

³¹ What, then, shall we say in response to this? If God is for us, who can be against us? ³² He who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all—how will he not also, along with him, graciously give us all things? ³³ Who will bring any charge against those whom God has chosen? It is God who justifies. ³⁴ Who is he that condemns? Christ Jesus, who died—more than that, who was raised to life—is at the right hand of God and is also interceding for us. ³⁵ Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword? ³⁶ As it is written: "For your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered."

³⁷ No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. ³⁸ For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, ³⁹ neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

GRACE IS UNIVERSAL AND PERSONAL

The advertisement arrives in bright, attractive packaging. The heading of the letter is large and distinct, assuring you that "You may have already won!" The winning number is printed boldly on the page, and you are directed to confirm your eligibility by scratching off the little silver box. When you do so, you find that the numbers clearly match, giving you every impression that you are a winner of a fantastic prize.

Except . . . you're not. Reading the fine print, you realize that the advertiser has no real intention of providing you with an actual gift for free. The letter is just a hook, designed to get your attention and get you to show up somewhere to claim your prize, which most likely includes listening to a professional sales staff trying to sell you something.

Aren't you glad that God's grace doesn't work like that? Unlike these bulk mailing advertisements where everyone is a "winner" but no one actually receives a prize, God's grace is universal, offered to all people of all nations. This grace is embodied in the person and work of Jesus Christ, as the apostle Paul wrote to Titus: "The grace of God has appeared that offers salvation to all people" (2:11). And God isn't concerned with turning a profit, but with sharing his grace in Christ with the whole world.

At the same time, this universal grace is received as a personal gift by simple faith. God connects you to his grace with his gospel message—both verbal and sacramental—so that through his divine power, you may be fully convinced of what he has done for all. He assures you: Jesus' death is his redeeming work for you. Jesus' unlimited holiness is your personal robe of righteousness. Jesus' glorious resurrection is your individual hope of rising from death. And this too is all by grace, as Paul rejoices, "It is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from

yourselves, it is the gift of God—not by works, so that no one can boast" (Ephesians 2:8,9).



You see, the promise of a universal gift is only useful if that gift is given to every single person. In God's grace in Christ, we have a gift without limit—an atoning sacrifice for the sins of every person of every generation since Adam. And yet what may seem impersonal in its vast supply is truly personal in its great value in our

individual lives. God's grace assures us: since Christ has died for all, he has died for you. Since Christ has died for you, you are saved. Only God's grace, and his grace alone, can be both universal and personal in a way that actually saves.

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
